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1. Synopsis

Blurb

Jake and the other finalists in a story writing competition have been invited to a stately home for a tour like no other. As their guide leads them through the grand rooms, hidden nooks, and magnificent grounds, they are about to hear the stories of seven ghosts who haunt these walls.

But strange shapes and shadows follow Jake as he journeys through the house. The tour guide's behaviour becomes ever more suspicious. With each tale that he hears, Jake begins to feel more uneasy, and soon he will discover that something is very, very wrong....

Ghost 1 illuminates class and entitlement. 1822.

Ghost 3 shows a different view of a wealthy family – earned wealth and how they feel it is important to 'look like' they appreciate the community. 1893.

Ghost 4 indicates the pressure to be a certain way and the need the child had for approval. 1911.

Ghost 5 highlights jealousy and envy in an aristocratic setting focused on parties and entertaining. 1920s.

Ghost 6 shows different residents of the hall - a rock musician. 1970s

Ghost 7 written in the first person – a reveal to the other threads. Present day.

2. Prepare Read Review Model

Prepare

Preparation of a book allows students to:

- Be ready for words not encountered before (decoding and understanding) fluency
- Understand the context of the book and access background information *knowledge*
- Build relationships with the characters and their motivation
- Build skills and knowledge which will enhance the enjoyment of the book *confidence*

Read

During reading, signposts are given to:

- Understanding
- Rhythm
- Tone
- Devices
- Opportunities to build fluency

Review

After reading there are opportunities to:

- Practise skills together
- Check and deepen understanding
- Pinpoint literacy
- Examine literal and inferential meanings
- Review, summarise and put each chapter in context
- Ask questions
- Form and express opinions
